- Zoning Bylaw Update to include Residential and Mixed-Use Zones

Council inquired as to whether this report considered the increase in demand for rental units being utilized during the Trans Mountain Pipeline Expansion Project. The Director of Community Development advised that the last census was done in 2021 and he is unsure of the amount of pipeline related activity that was captured. He added that there is still a need for rental housing, and that these reports are generated with consideration for regional housing needs.

Moved / Seconded

6. COMMITTEE REPORTS

There were no Committee Reports.

7. MAYOR AND COUNCIL REPORTS

Mayor Smith Reported:

- He participated in an Enbridge roundtable with stakeholders in the community to discuss the upcoming Sunrise Expansion Project, noting that it was well attended and good input was provided.
- He attended the Energy Futures Townhall Meeting where he viewed the Local Government at the Crossroads of Affordability and Transition presentation by Barry Penner. He noted that there is a growing need for power generation in B.C. to meet demand, and that Council and staff have are working to put the District in a better position while being financially responsible.

He noted that Washington State has given BC notice that they will not be able to supply power in the near future as their demands have increased. It is projected that BC has a proposed 7000 megawatt demand coming for new industries, whereby Site C will only supply 1100 megawatts when in full operation.

- He attended former MLA Jackie Tegart's retirement event in Merritt along with Councillor Stewin, noting that they presented her with a framed print and acknowledged the excellent relationship she shared with District Council and staff during her 10 years of service.
- He attended the Chilliwack Christmas Appreciation Breakfast where they discussed the successes of 2024 and plans for the future of Upper Fraser Valley tourism. He added that there were 252 attendees at the event.
- He attended the Newcomer Fair on November 19th, noting that he welcomed individuals to the District, connected with new people, and shared services in the community.
- He announced that the District's Christmas Tree Lighting Event will take place on November 30th from 5:00 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. He noted that the tree is being provided by the Hope Lions Club, and other events include an LED picture frame by AdvantageHOPE, hot chocolate by Hope Community Services, and glow sticks for kids by the Hope & District Chamber of Commerce and Hope Fire Department.

Councillor Skoglund Reported:

- She attended the Beta Sigma Phi Craft Fair at the Legion Hall on November 16th

and noted that it may be the last year for this event as their volunteers begin to age out.

- She announced that the Hope Community Choir Christmas Concert will take place on December 1st at 2:00 p.m. at the Grace Baptist Church.
- She announced that the Stuff the Cruiser event will be taking place on December 7th with a pancake breakfast from 8:30 a.m. to 10:30 a.m., and the cruiser taking donations until 2:00 p.m. She added that Kal Tire will be matching all cash donations made on December 7th up to \$5000, with donations going to the food bank.
- She attended a District of Hope Accessibility Committee meeting on November 25th, noting that they discussed adding benches and accessible picnic tables in areas of the community that lack these amenities.

Councillor Medlock Reported:

- He attended the AdvantageHOPE meeting on November 21st.
- He attended the Hope and Area Transition Society (HATS) meeting on November 16th, noting that the temporary winter shelter is now open with 3-4 beds remaining out of 20 total.
- He noted that HATS is undertaking a rebranding and they will be changing their name to the Cedar Strong Prevention and Intervention Society, noting that the organization has expanded over the last 30 years and the new name will encompass their new services while maintaining core values. He added that more information will be available on their new website, cedarstrong.org, which will be online soon.
- He announced that the Santa Ride event hosted by Hope Towing and the Hope Lions Club will be taking place on December 14th from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. He noted that they will be accepting cash and food donations for the Full Cupboard Program.

Councillor Smith Reported:

- He noted that he spoke with Mike Brodzik regarding the upcoming Mount Hope Mountain Bike Trail that is being developed. He noted that social media groups for the trail network reached over 9,000 members in three days, and that the trail opening may result in an influx of visitors to the community.
- He attended the Curling Club Meat Draw Fundraiser at the Legion Hall on November 23rd, noting that it was well attended.
- He attended the AdvantageHOPE meeting on November 21st, noting that the MRDT intake for the month of October was the highest October that they have ever had, and the second highest month overall since they began collecting. He added that these numbers are post-pipeline and continuing to grow.
- He noted that AdvantageHOPE is continuing to review museum artifacts in the new storage facility, noting that they hope to complete 40% of the collection by the end of December, and the remainder by March 2025.
- He announced that the 2nd Annual Fog Fest is ongoing until the end of November, noting that businesses are seeing great turnouts.

Councillor Stewin Reported:

- She attended former MLA Jackie Tegart's retirement event in Merritt with Mayor Smith.
- She attended the 75th anniversary of the Harrison Hot Springs Elementary School, noting that there was a band, dancing, and a great celebration.

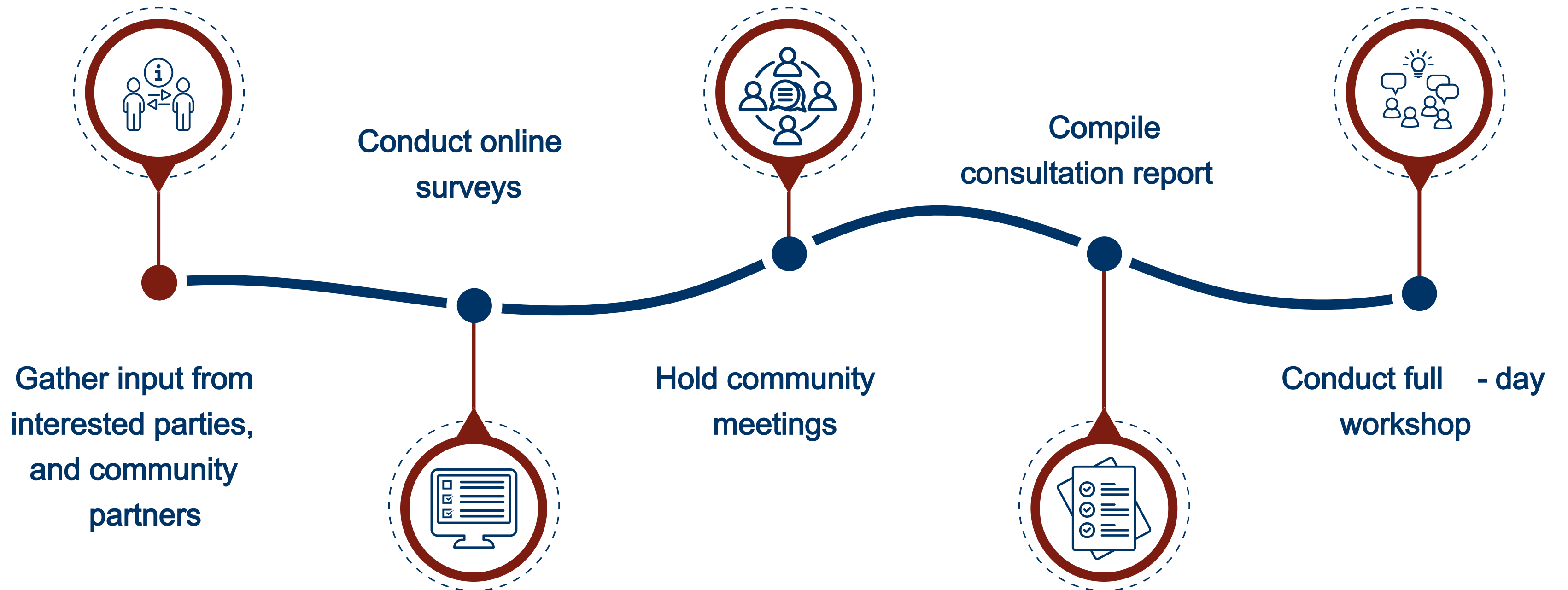
Purpose

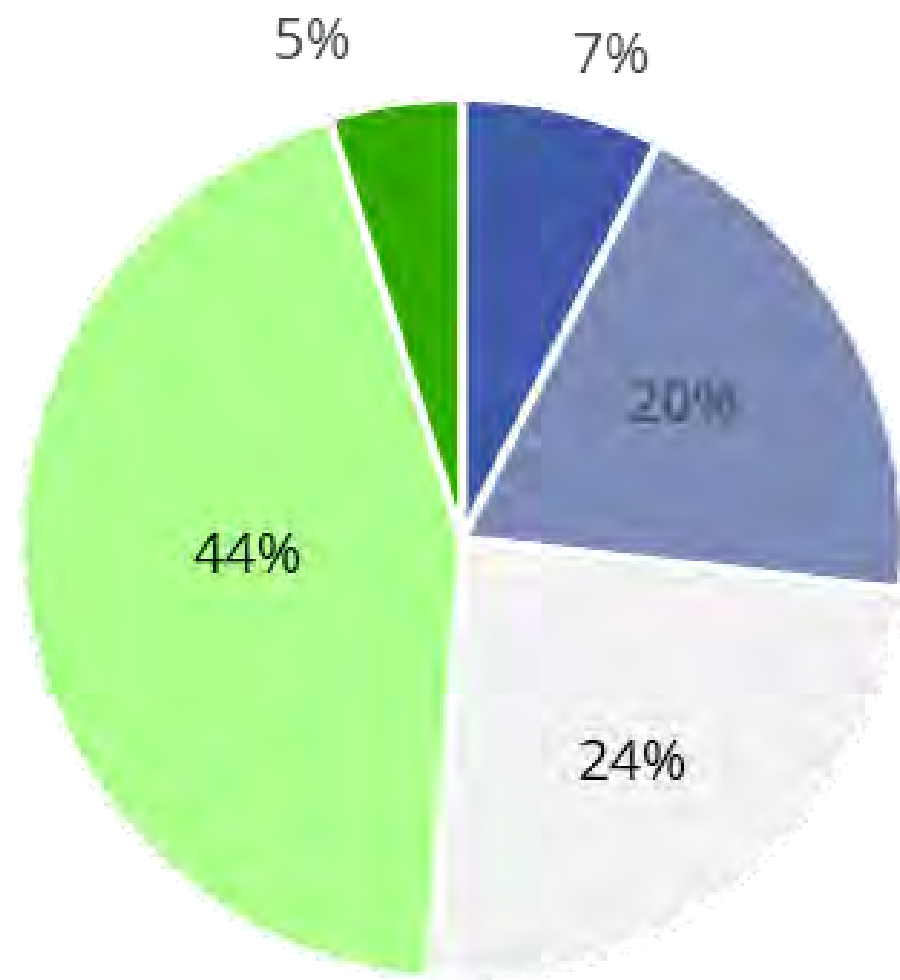

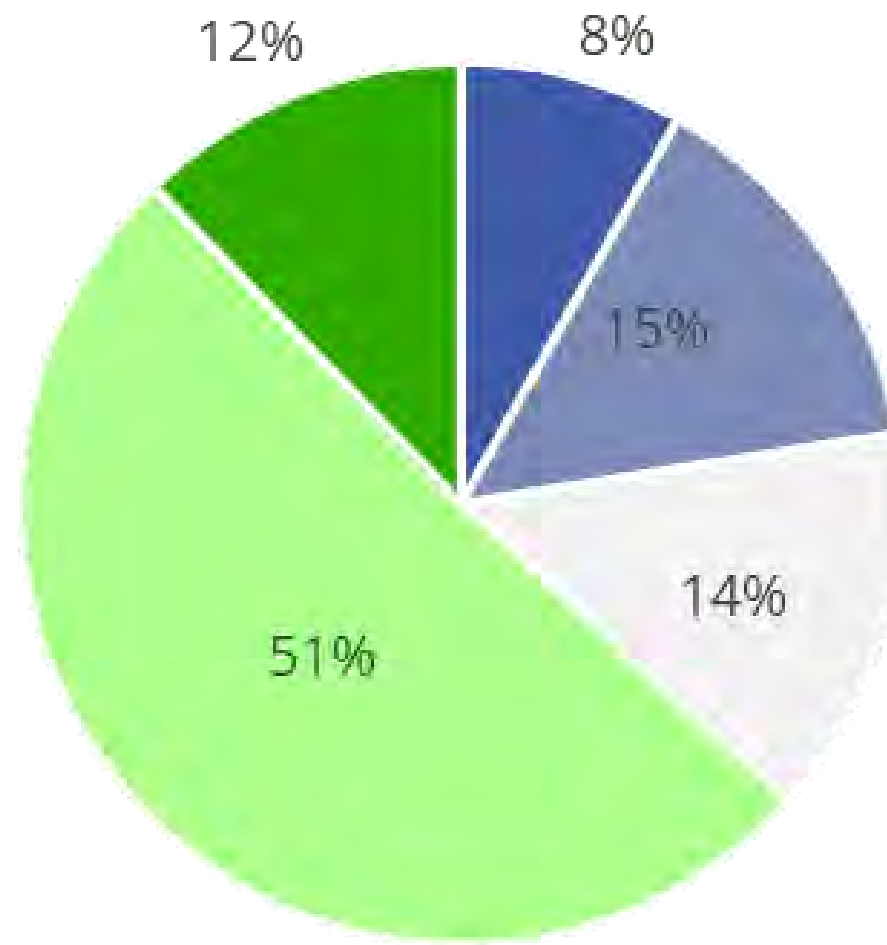

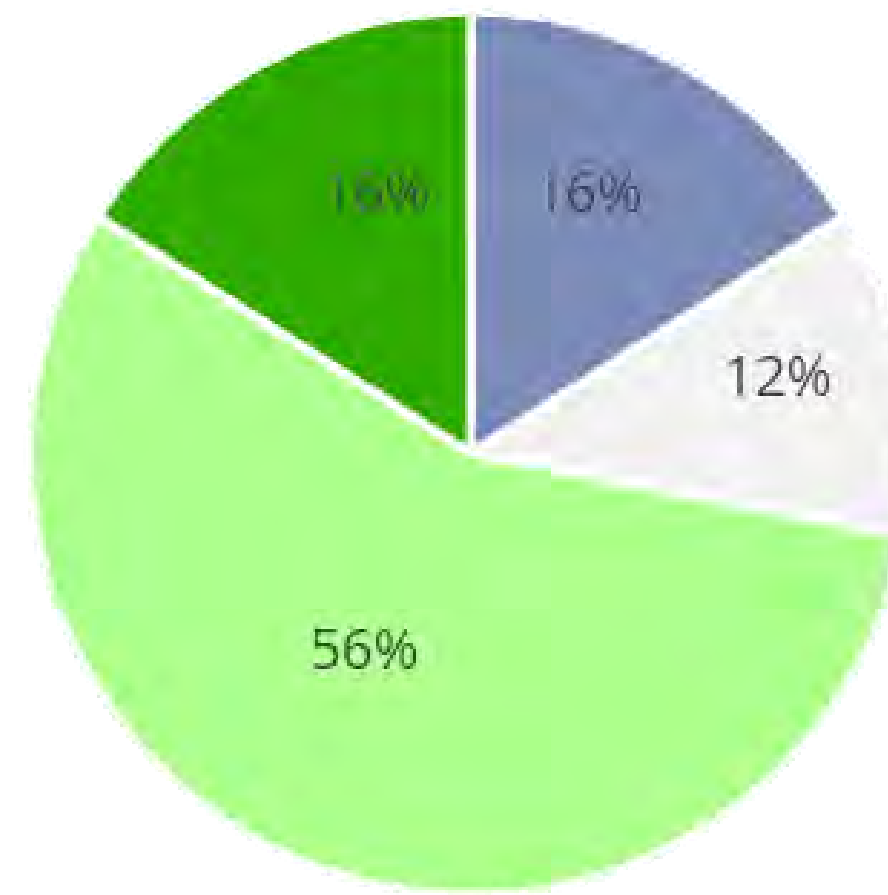
Job Seeker (n=41)

When I look around my workplace, it represents the diversity within my community.

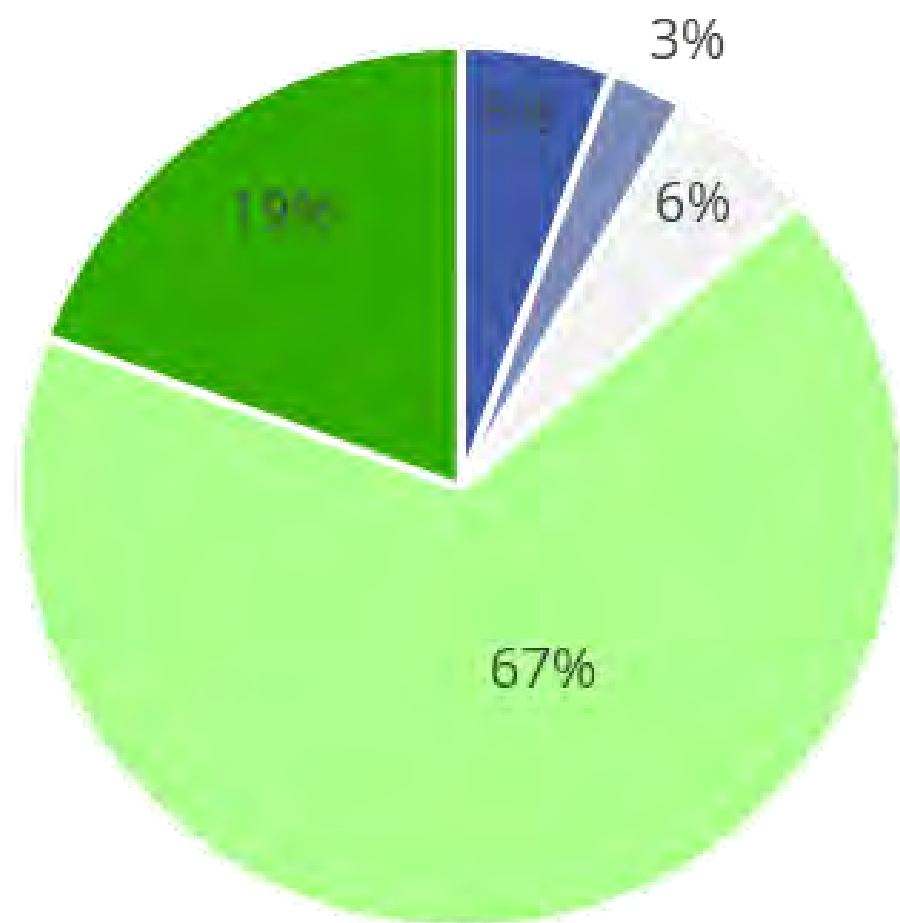


Employers (n=25)

When I look around my community, my business/organization adequately represents its diversity.

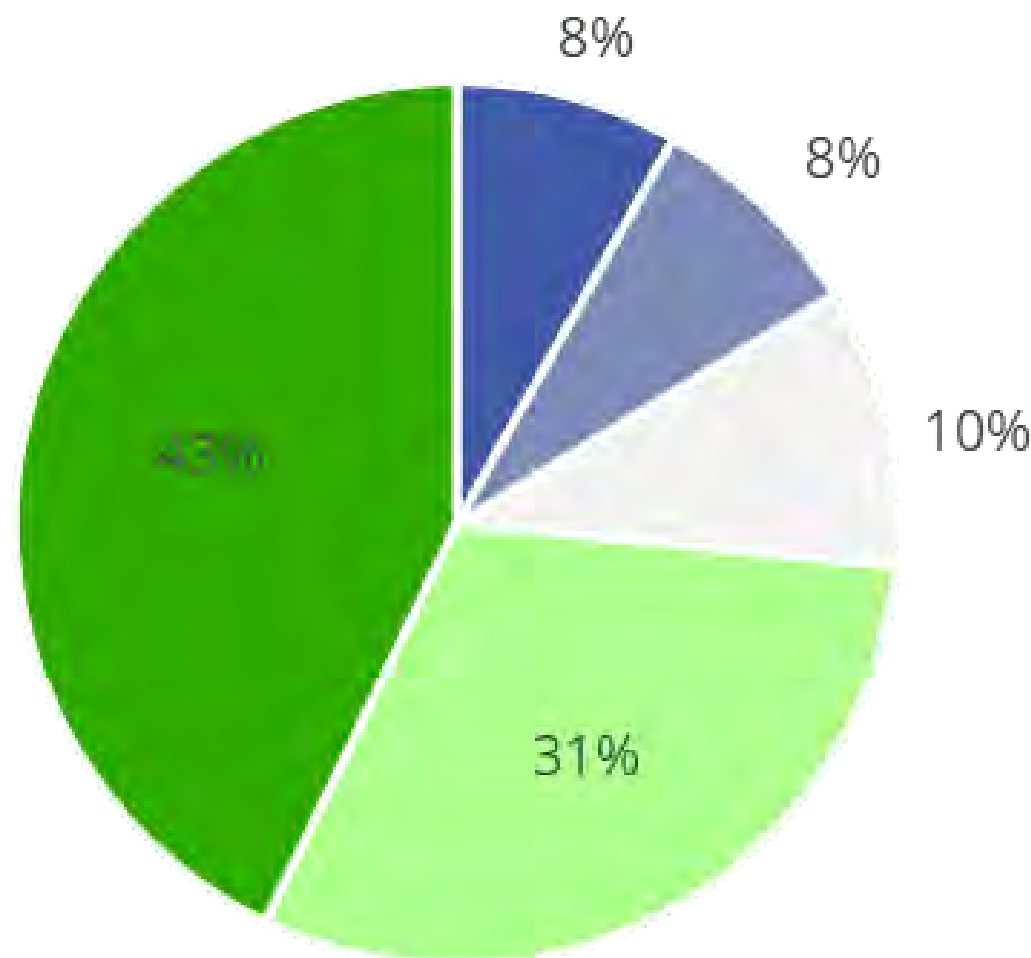
Perceptions of Diversity

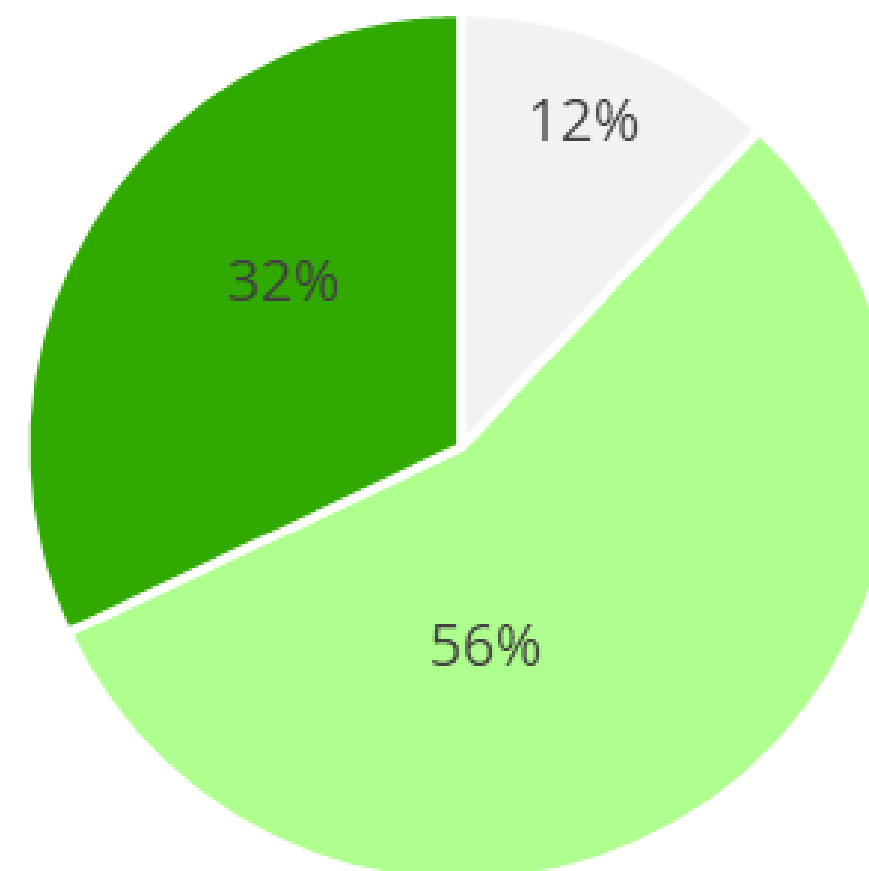
Job Seeker (n=36)

My current employer fully supports my success at work.

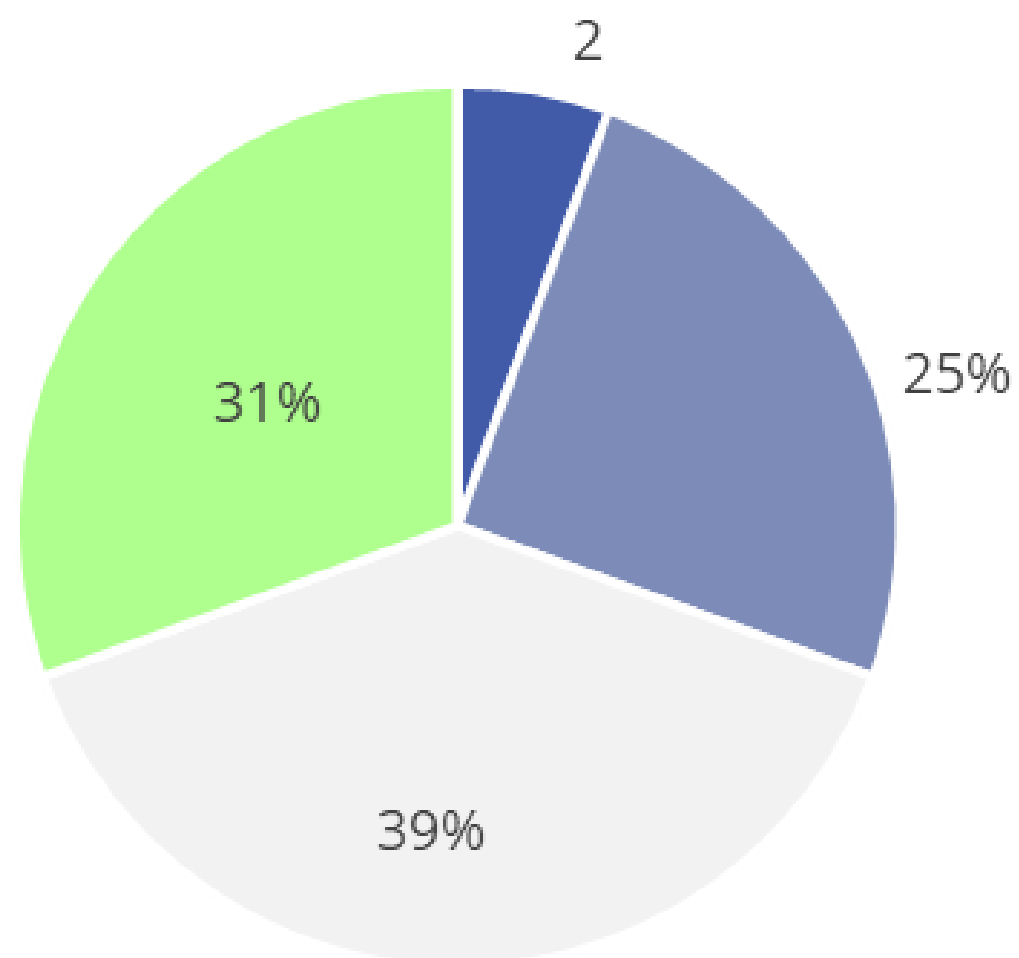


Employers (n=25)

My business/organization fully supports individuals with specific accessibility or cultural needs to be successful at work.

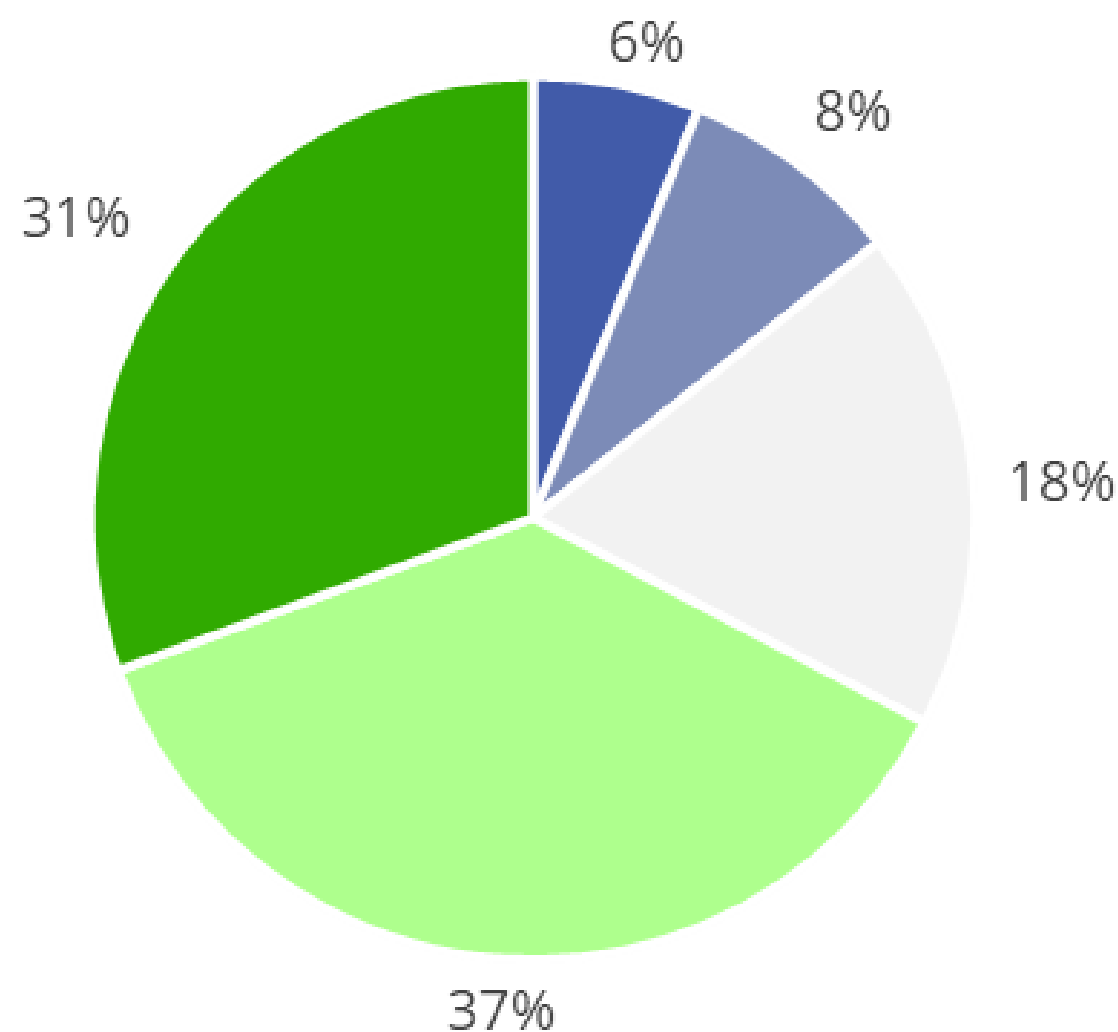

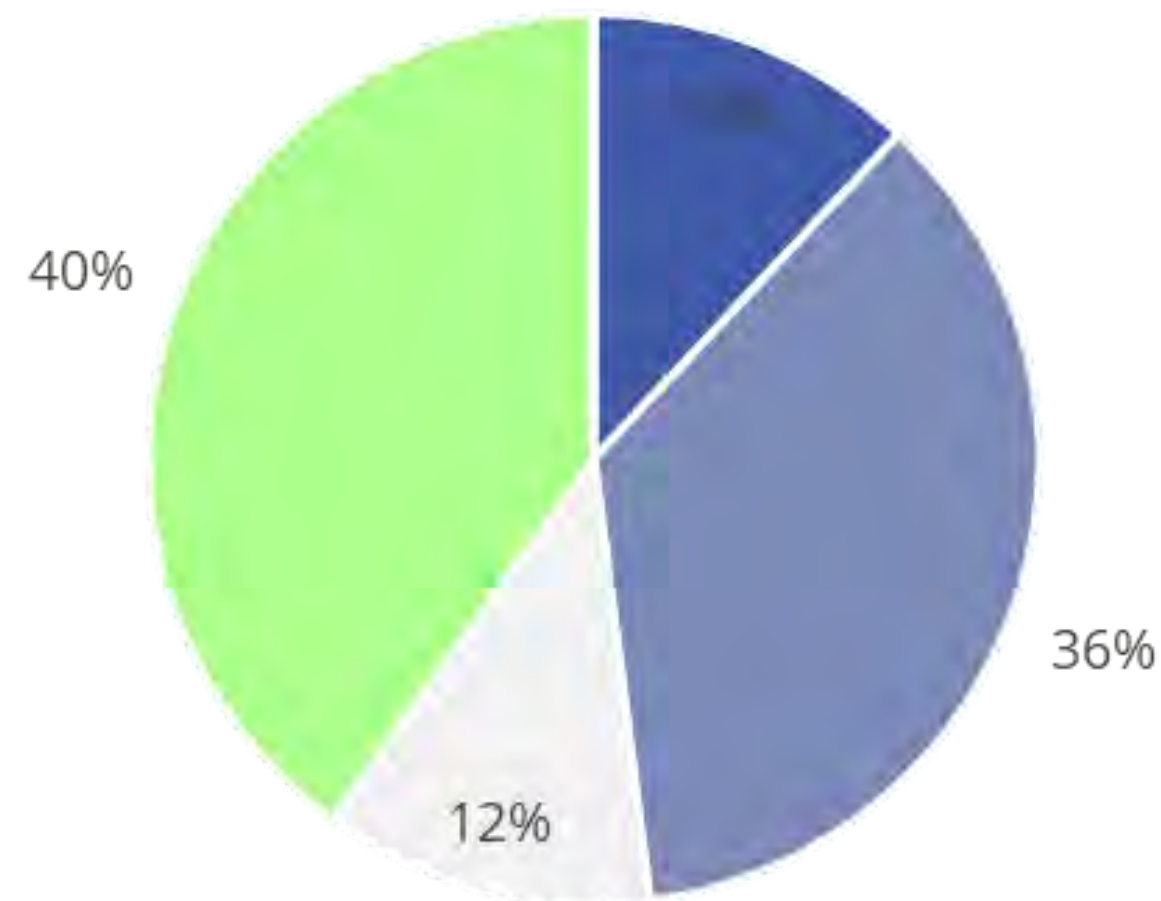

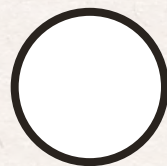

"After we sold the business, I wanted to get a job, and a lot of the people that I had employed, their parents were also business owners. And you think anybody would take a chance and hire me because I couldn't see? It's a barrier, right? And the biggest common complaints were 'well, what if you got hurt at work? Would WCB cover you?' 'Why would I hire you if I could hire somebody that could see?' You know, I heard some pretty mean things from people that I cared about. But it's not easy. As soon as you disclose that you have a disability, that person puts their guard up and that all goes through their mind, 'If I'm gonna pay you, then why not pay someone that can do the job without assistance kind of thing. Lots of discrimination. The conversation in my world of low vision is to disclose or not to disclose. Do you tell people that you have a visual impairment? And at some points you have to because of safety, but otherwise [I'm in prominent community positions] and I hid it as best as I could for a long time. Because there's bias and there's judgement. As soon as they see you with your cane it's like all of a sudden the world changes."

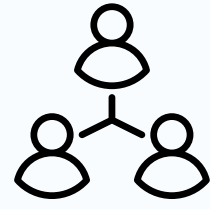

SUBJECT: Cascade Lower Canyon Community Forest – Squeah Forest Road Access

PURPOSE:

The purpose of this report is to provide Council with information regarding the Cascade Lower Canyon Community Forest (CLCCF) ongoing issue regarding its access being blocked to one third of its forest tenure by Union Bar First Nation. In addition, this report seeks Council's endorsement to send a letter to members of the Provincial Government requesting (again) action to make the CLCCF whole by either resolving the dispute with Union Bar First Nation (UBFN) to restore access; or, substitute a new tenure to replace that not accessible since 2021.

RESOLUTION:

THAT Council has reviewed the situation surrounding the Cascade Lower Canyon Community Forest Squeah Forest Service Road Access Issues;

AND THAT Council finds the lack of response and action by the Provincial Government unfortunate and unacceptable;

AND THAT Council acknowledges that the District of Hope is one of three shareholders in the Cascade Lower Canyon Community Forest;

AND THAT Council has reviewed the November 28, 2024 correspondence from the Cascade Lower Canyon Community Forest and fully endorses the requests being made and authorizes the Mayor to sign on behalf of Council;

AND FURTHER THAT Council directs that an official copy of this resolution be attached to the letter being sent by the Cascade Lower Canyon Community Forest for transmission to the Provincial Government.

ANALYSIS:

Rationale:

This has been a long-simmering issue of which the CLCCF, individual shareholders, and District of Hope Mayors (previous and current) have attempted to solve with UBFN. What is clear, from a lack of response by the Province to previous requests by the CLCCF, that stronger action is required. The 1/3 of the forest tenure blocked, provides for some of the most productive fibre harvesting potential and thus revenue potential. CLCCF operations plans obviously rest with the clear ability to access this tenure to optimize sustainability and revenue for the shareholders and their respective communities.

Dear Minister Parmar, Director Husband, District Manager Peters, Regional Executive Director Johnsrude, and Operations Manager Dayton,

Re: CLCCF Lower Canyon Community Forest Tenure Access

First we would like congratulate Minister Parmar for his appointment as the new Minister of Forests. CLCCF believes that with Minister Parmar's fresh perspective and willingness to find solutions to ensure that we have a vibrant and sustainable forest industry in the Hope area. The Minister having the back of our hard working forest industry workers and supporting a community based forest tenure, such as the CLCCF Community is essential for its success.

We are the three Partners of the Cascade Lower Canyon Community Forest Corporation ("CLCCF"), Yale First Nation, Fraser Valley Regional District and the District of Hope. CLCCF is a valuable asset to the three Partners and has provided and continues to provide a number of benefits to the surrounding communities. Due to the access issue, via the Squeah FSR into East Yale, the future of the Community forest is in serious jeopardy. CLCCF sent a letter, regarding this topic, through our lawyers Miller Titerle, on September 9, 2022 (attached). Since this letter was sent, this issue has not been resolved and the Ministry has reported very little to CLCCF regarding the Ministry's work on this issue.

CLCCF is the manager of a community forest that is located in the Chilliwack Natural Resource District and involves partnerships with the Yale First Nation, Fraser Valley Regional District, and

the District of Hope (the “**Community Forest**”). CLCCF initially entered into a Community Forest Agreement in 2011 (the “**2011 CFA**”), which was renewed in 2021 (the “**2021 CFA**”).

Approximately 8000ha is currently not accessible to the CLCCF due to the Union Bar First Nation not allowing access into East Yale via the Squeah FSR that crosses its reserve land. What may have been an aggravating situation that may have influenced Union Bar First Nation's rationale for denying access has been resolved by the District of Hope. Therefore, there is currently no known reason for denied access.

Ministry Responsible for Resolving Access Issue

The Ministry must assist CLCCF in resolving this access issue. CLCCF relied on the Ministry to resolve the access issue prior to entering into the 2011 CFA, but now finds itself in a position where nearly a third of its tenure is inaccessible. This creates serious issues for the operational and financial viability of the Community Forest in the near and long term, which has negative consequences for the communities that rely on Community Forest revenues.

The Ministry has been aware of Union Bar's concerns with the FSR for many years. Prior to CLCCF accepting the 2011 CFA, Union Bar raised their opposition to the Community Forest and use of the FSR and indicated the possibility of restricting access to East Yale. The correspondence included as **Appendices C – F** demonstrate that the Ministry was aware of Union Bar's concerns regarding use of the FSR through its reserves, consulted with Union Bar, and accommodated the issues identified by Union Bar during the consultation process by making “specific amendments” and adding “unique clauses” to the 2011 CFA.

CLCCF relied on the Ministry to fulfil its duty to adequately consult with and offer accommodations to First Nations who might be affected by the Ministry's decision to issue the 2011 CFA, including Union Bar. CLCCF entered into the 2011 CFA on the understanding that the Ministry adequately addressed and accommodated Union Bar's concerns regarding the FSR such that CLCCF could access and use the entirety of the Community Forest area. CLCCF would not have accepted a tenure knowing that a full third of it was effectively unusable.

Not only were Union Bar's concerns accommodated through the 2011 CFA consultation process, but Union Bar has since committed to providing industry access to the FSR and has been compensated for those commitments. Union Bar, by closing the FSR and preventing CLCCF from accessing East Yale, is violating its obligations under its 2021 FCRSA (appended to this letter as **Appendix G**).¹ Under section 11.1 of the 2021 FCRSA, Union Bar agreed not to “support or participate in any acts that frustrate, delay, stop or otherwise physically impede or interfere with provincially authorized forest activities.”

CLCCF is provincially authorized to harvest and conduct certain activities in East Yale. The Ministry granted CLCCF a cutting permit that entitles CLCCF to harvest timber anywhere in the Community Forest. Additionally, CLCCF is provincially authorized to carry out certain activities in the Community Forest under the 2021 CFA, including:

- (a) carrying out silvicultural treatments;
- (b) collecting inventory information;

¹ The Province and Union Bar entered into the 2021 FCRSA in February 2021, and the Ministry offered Cascade the 2021 CFA in May 2021.

- (c) carrying out engineering layout and surveys;
- (d) carrying out protection and forest health activities under forestry legislation; and
- (e) fulfilling other obligation or conducting other activities incidental to the operations of CLCCF under or associated with the 2021 CFA.

Although CLCCF has the appropriate provincial authorizations, CLCCF cannot exercise these rights due to Union Bar's closure of the FSR, contrary to the 2021 FCRSA.

Further, sections 2, 7.2, and 7.3 of the 2021 FCRSA indicate that Union Bar has already been accommodated for impacts resulting from CLCCF's access to and use of the Community Forest. Section 2(b) states that one of the 2021 FCRSA's purposes is:

"to provide a Revenue Sharing Contribution...as an accommodation for *any adverse impacts* to Union Bar First Nation's Aboriginal Interests *resulting from forest and range resource development within the Traditional Territory...*"

This is echoed in section 7.2 of the 2021 FCRSA, in which Union Bar agrees that Revenue Sharing Contributions, as defined in that agreement, are an accommodation for such adverse impacts. Under section 7.3, Union Bar further agreed that if the consultation process set out in the 2021 FCRSA was followed, then the Province has adequately consulted and provided an accommodation for potential adverse impacts resulting from the Ministry's decisions, such as issuing or replacing a community forest agreement, establishing a community forest agreement area, and approving or amending a community forest management plan.

As a result, if the Province adequately consulted with Union Bar on the 2021 CFA, Union Bar has been adequately consulted and accommodated for impacts resulting from CLCCF's forest and range development activities and should not be permitted to withhold access to East Yale. Alternatively, if the Province failed to adequately consult with Union Bar pursuant to the 2021 FCRSA, the Ministry inaccurately represented to CLCCF the context in which the 2021 CFA was offered. Either way, the Ministry bears the responsibility for resolving this situation.

Impacts from Access Issue and Management Plan Issue

Impacts to CLCCF

The East Yale portion of the Community Forest represents a full third of CLCCF's total tenure area and contains significant stocks of timber in operationally viable areas. CLCCF is already experiencing impacts from the lack of access to this area, and if access continues to be withheld, the long-term viability of the Community Forest may be compromised. CLCCF has focused its engineering and planning activities in other areas of the Community Forest, but once those have been harvested, only a few years of timber volume that is readily available and accessible will remain.

CLCCF's current AAC under the Original Management Plan is 30,900 m³, which was based on estimates prepared by the Ministry. The proposed AAC under the 2021 Management Plan is approximately 43,000 m³, which is based on improved modelling systems. These models indicate that, if East Yale is made accessible, the Community Forest could readily support an AAC of 43,000 m³. Without access, CLCCF faces challenges to meeting its cut control obligations, as it must balance numerous non-timber resource values including requirements relating to harvesting timing, cutblock placement, and green up. Access to East Yale would allow CLCCF greater flexibility in planning where it will harvest and when, allowing time for

previously harvested areas across the Community Forest to regenerate enough to support harvesting in areas adjacent to them.

Impacts to Partner Communities

CLCCF is partnered with the Fraser Valley Regional District, the District of Hope, and Yale First Nation. These partners share in the profits CLCCF produces from the Community Forest and enjoy the benefits of local forest resource management. These benefits include supporting community economic development, local employment, local decision making, improving sustainable resource use, protecting drinking watersheds, viewsapes, and other community values, enhancing opportunities for education and research, and incorporating Indigenous cultural values into forest stewardship and planning.

Over the last few years, CLCCF shared over \$1,200,000 with its partner communities. However, the Ministry's failure to take responsibility for resolving the FSR access issue means that CLCCF is missing out on revenue in the range of millions of dollars that would be reinvested in the local economies. The success of the Community Forest is directly tied to improvements for these partner communities, which is the entire point of the community forest tenure system.

Additionally, based on CLCCF's 20-year projections, if they are unable to harvest in East Yale they will eventually be forced to stop harvesting in other areas of the Community Forest to avoid the undesirable outcomes associated with overharvesting. Further, not being able to harvest in East Yale would result in increased harvesting in Yale First Nation's traditional hunting areas. CLCCF and Yale First Nation wish to avoid this, as continued harvesting in those areas may have impacts for species regularly used by Yale First Nation's members.

Risks to the Community and Environment

Over and above the impacts to the CLCCF revenue source and its ability to manage its forest tenure, there are risks to the local community and the environment from the possibility of fire and road failure. Without access to the Squeah FSR BC Wildfire cannot access the area to fight fires, thus creating a greater risk to the Municipality of Hope and the local First Nation communities. To add to this issue, the Squeah FSR has not been maintained in multiple years and may not be useable at this point. A road that has not been maintained or deactivated properly increases the probability of a road failure and an impact to the surrounding environment and fisheries. CLCCF has the ability to reduce these risks by properly maintaining the road once provided authority to do so.

Moving Forward

These issues have now reached a point where action is required, and further delay is unacceptable. Each of the CLCCF Partner Councils and Board (Yale First Nation, FVRD, District of Hope) have reviewed, endorsed and support this request in the best interest of their collective communities.

CLCCF requests that the Minister meet with CLCCF to determine a path forward to resolve the access issues set out in this letter and find a fair resolution that considers the interests of all parties involved. The Ministry has already indicated to CLCCF, in a letter dated November 12, 2021, (appended to this letter as **Appendix H**) that it will pursue any reasonable opportunities to negotiate access over the FSR on Union Bar's reserves, is willing to discuss alternative routes to access East Yale, and will consider offering replacement tenure areas. However, since receiving that letter CLCCF has had no updates and has heard nothing further from the Ministry with respect to finding solutions to this issue.

Now that the Union Bar First Nation has made it very clear they will not allow access across their reserve land, CLCCF requires the Ministry provide a replacement tenure area.

Minister Parmar, please provide your availability for a meeting to be held before the end of December 2024. We look forward to hearing from you.

SUBJECT: Deaccession of Museum Artifacts – December 2, 2024

PURPOSE:

The purpose of this report is to seek Council authorization to deaccession additional artifacts from the museum.

A. Rationale:

December 2, 2024 - Hope Museum Artifacts for Deaccession

When an object is accessioned into the Hope Museum's collection, it becomes part of the material culture of British Columbia as well as the legal property of the District of Hope. Collection priorities change over time, and with the Hope Museum's changing circumstances there is an opportunity to reassess the museum collection to be sure that Hope's history is truly highlighted. The priority is to keep as much as possible within the museum system, so objects in this list that are in good condition are recommended to be offered to other museums in BC through the mailing list of the BC Museums Association and reassessed if they are not accepted by any other museum. Objects that are in too poor of a condition to be accepted by other museums (or if they pose a danger to humans in some way that cannot be mitigated) are recommended for disposal. In the case of any objects that were never accessioned into the collection and no donation paperwork is associated, as these objects are not legally owned by the District of Hope, we cannot offer them to other museums so I recommend disposal as abandoned property.

The purpose of this report is for Council of the District of Hope to review *Fraser Valley Regional District Recreation Programming Service Area Conversion and Amendment Bylaw No. 1752, 2024*.

ANALYSIS:

A. Budget Implications:

The FVRD's maximum taxation for all areas is \$315K based on the 2024 data. The 2025 taxation is based on the 2025 financial plan and Hope's share is \$151K (\$6K increased from last year and 4% increase).

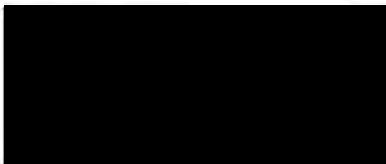

Fraser Valley Regional District Recreation Programming Service Area Conversion and Amendment Bylaw No. 1752, 2024 was given three readings by the Fraser Valley Regional District Board of Directors on November 28, 2024, a certified copy of which is enclosed for your reference. Also enclosed is a background memorandum which will provide your council with further information. BACKGROUND

As part of the Financial Planning process, the FVRD will set tax requisition levels through the Financial Planning Bylaw for 5-year increments (confirmed and approved annually). As required by the Local Government Act (LGA), the FVRD is also required to adopt Service Area Establishing Bylaws, setting the maximum allowable requisition for each Service Area, with some exceptions. Periodically, Staff complete a review of the Financial Plan (the Plan), to ensure it does not exceed the maximum requisition stated in the Establishing Bylaw.

The legislation regarding service area establishment has changed over time and any services established under the previous Municipal Act must be converted to an FVRD Service Area bylaw to include the content required in the LGA as soon as a natural opportunity arises. When there is a requirement to amend a bylaw requisition limit, staff consider the amendment to be a natural

opportunity to also convert services into formal Service Areas where applicable. The conversions will be included in the amendment bylaws where necessary and where there is no outstanding debt.

In addition, the merger of service areas that were established prior to the amalgamation of Regional District of Fraser-Cheam (RDFC), Dewdney-Alouette Regional District (DARD) and Central Fraser Valley Regional District (CFVRD) to form the Fraser Valley Regional District, but are today considered regional services, can simplify accounting processes and tracking.

DISCUSSION

As part of the 2025 Financial Planning process, an initial administrative review of requisition levels has been conducted to ensure Service Area Establishment bylaws have adequate taxation limits and are converted or merged post-amalgamation. Staff are proposing revisions to maximum taxation levels based on the 5-year Financial Plan adopted in 2024 to allow sufficient time for ministry approval prior to taxation based on the 2025 Financial Plan. The following bylaws require an amendment to the maximum requisition:

- Noxious Weed Control (Bylaw 1750, 2024)
- Recreation Programming (Bylaw 1752, 2024)
- Air Quality Management (Bylaw 1753, 2024)

Although the Library Service Bylaw 1591, 2020 merging and establishing the Library Service Area, does not require a stated maximum requisition, this service area can be merged post-amalgamation for simplifying accounting processes and is attached to this report.

In addition, the North Cultus Sewer Parcel Tax Bylaw No. 1499, 2018 stating the Parcel Tax maximum amount, has been updated to be consistent with the taxation maximums established in North Cultus Sewer Service Area Establishment Bylaw No. 876, 1989. Staff are amending the Parcel Tax bylaw to preserve the taxation maximums already established in 1989.

All amended bylaws are attached to this report for review and include the amended maximums. Bylaw No. 1750, 1752, and 1753 will further require municipal consent and ministry approval prior to final adoption.

COST

These bylaw changes are administrative in nature and set the maximum limit to taxation, as per the requirements in legislation. Annual taxation is based upon the annually approved Financial Plan.

CONCLUSION

As a step in the financial planning process, there are bylaws proposed to be amended, increasing the maximum requisition based on the Financial Plan adopted in 2024 and converting these bylaws to Service Areas as legislation requires.

A bylaw to convert the Regional District of Fraser-Cheam recreation programming function to a Service Area and to amend the requisition limits for the service.

WHEREAS the Regional District of Fraser-Cheam ("RDFC") was granted the function of recreation programming through Supplementary Letters Patent dated September 28, 1972 with the participants being the Town of Hope and RDFC Electoral Areas A, B, and C.

AND WHEREAS the current corresponding participating Electoral Areas of the Fraser Valley Regional District ("FVRD") for the service are the District of Hope and FVRD Electoral Areas A and B;

AND WHEREAS in accordance with S. 341 of the *Local Government Act* the Fraser Valley Regional District Board of Directors ("the Board") wishes to convert the RDFC recreation programming function as granted by Supplementary Letters Patent to a Service Area;

- b) The participating areas for the service established by this bylaw shall be the District of Hope and Electoral Areas A and B of the Fraser Valley Regional District.
- c) The boundaries of the service area established by this bylaw shall be the boundaries of the District of Hope and Electoral Areas A and B of the Fraser Valley Regional District.
- d) The annual costs for the service established by this bylaw shall be recovered by one or more of the following:

- i. The requisition of money to be collected by a property value tax;
 - ii. The imposition of fees and other charges that may be fixed by separate bylaw for the purpose of recovering these costs; and/or
 - iii. Revenues received by way of agreement, enterprise, gift, grant or otherwise.
- e) The maximum amount that may be requisitioned annually for the service established by this bylaw shall be \$314,600 or an amount equal to that which could be raised by a property value tax rate of \$0.100/\$1000 applied to the net taxable value of the land and improvements within the service area, whichever is greater.

3) SEVERABILITY

If a portion of this bylaw is found invalid by a court, it will be severed and the remainder of the bylaw will remain in effect.

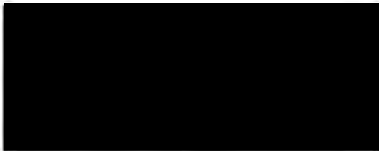

RECOMMENDATIONS 2025/26

PURPOSE:

The purpose of report is to bring forward the District of Hope Council Accessibility Advisory Committee recommendations regarding the location, distribution, and number of public benches and accessible picnic tables within Hope. These recommendations would then be considered by Council for inclusion in District workplans/budgets for the fiscal years 2025 and 2026.

RECOMMENDATION:

Recommended Resolution:

THAT Council receives the Council Accessibility Advisory Committee report and recommendations regarding public benches and accessible picnic tables within Hope;

AND THAT Council endorses the recommended changes for the fiscal years of 2025 and 2026;

AND FURTHER THAT Council directs Staff to achieve portions of the plan in 2025 within the existing 2025 budget and include the remainder within the 2026 Financial Plan.

HISTORY:

The Provincial Government mandated that BC local governments establish community accessibility advisory committees. These committees are to create ongoing accessibility plans that can be tailored to each individual community and thus vary in scope and ambition.

Hope's new committee has prioritized benches and accessible picnic tables as its first project to optimize the ability of residents and visitors to rest while commuting by foot, and better enjoy recreational locations within Hope. This effort resulted in the attached recommendations and this report.

ALTERNATIVES & IMPLICATIONS:

Council has three alternatives when considering this report and its recommendations. These are:

1. Endorse and authorize the recommendations “as is” for inclusion in District budgets and workplans.
2. Partially endorse and authorize only some of the recommendations for inclusion in the District budgets and workplans.
3. Neither endorse nor authorize any of the recommendations.

ANALYSIS (OPTIONS):

1. Endorsing and authorizing the recommendations “as is” for inclusion in District budgets and workplans:
 - a. Pros:
 - i. Some benches/accessible picnic tables could be acquired within the 2025 District Budget without modification. The remainder would be formally costed and included in the District 2026 budget.
 - ii. Progress would be timely with further certainty for 2026.
 - b. Cons:
 - i. Exact number of benches/accessible picnic tables to be acquired in 2025 not known as these were not formally envisioned within the 2025 District Budget. Therefore, discretion will be up to the Director of Operations as to how many to acquire and where to place them.
2. Partially endorse and authorize only some of the recommendations for inclusion in the District budgets and workplans:
 - a. Pros:
 - i. Council can achieve a more flexible and tailored acquisition and placement plan if desired.
 - ii. Could push entire rollout and costs into 2026 budget if so desired.
 - b. Cons:
 - i. May likely delay decisions regarding acquisition and placement as Council will need to go through, in detail, all the individual recommendations.

3. Neither endorse nor authorize any of the recommendations:

a. Pros:

- i. All costs will be avoided while the current inventory and locations of benches/accessible picnic tables remains the same.

b. Cons:

- i. Committee recommendations and work, regarding optimizing the ability to rest while travelling and utilize accessible picnic tables may seem mean-spirited considering the nature and amount of work put in by the Committee and public input.

Council should note that exact models chosen, and costs for the aforementioned benches and accessible picnic tables has not been completed. The Committee also recommends that the priority for roll out be the accessible picnic tables, then benches. District Operations though, has reviewed the recommendations and believes there are no “show stoppers” identified in the recommendations.

RECOMMENDATION

On the basis of the analysis provided above, it is recommended that the best option is option 1. It respects the work done by the Committee and the public while allowing for an economic and flexible rollout of the recommendations.

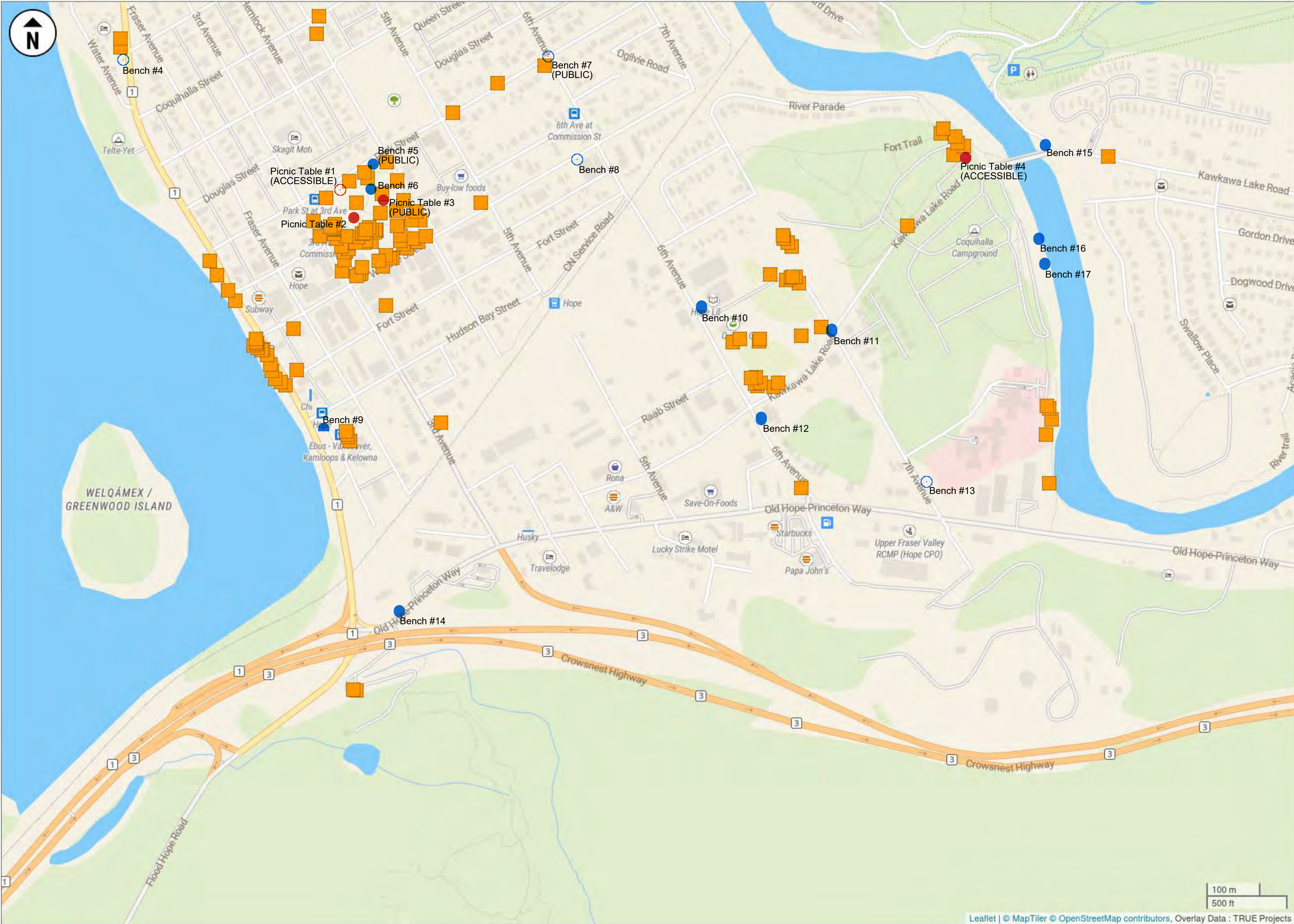

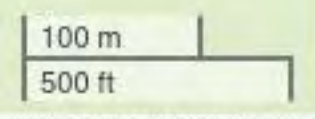

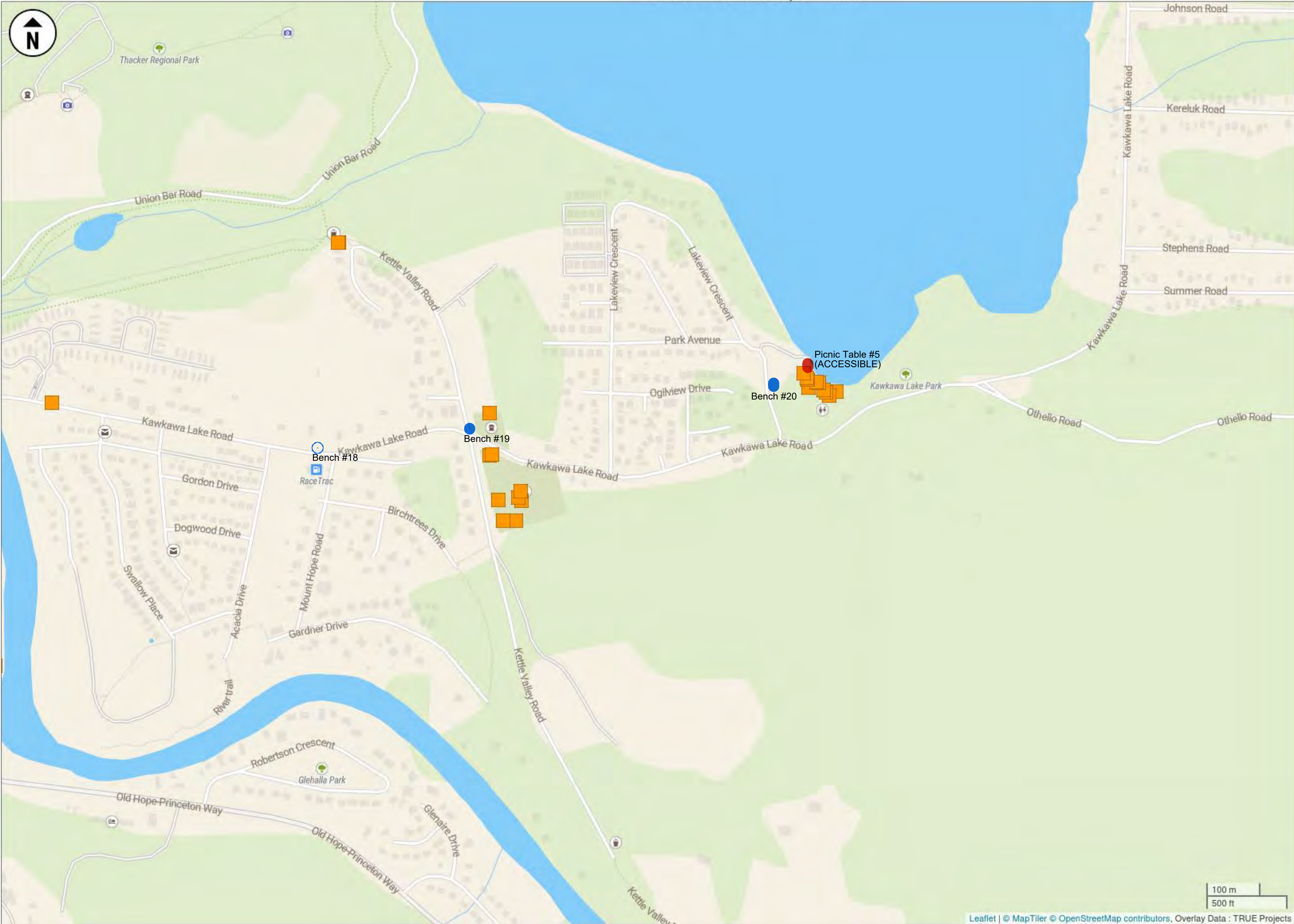
Benches Park Street and South



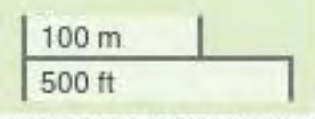
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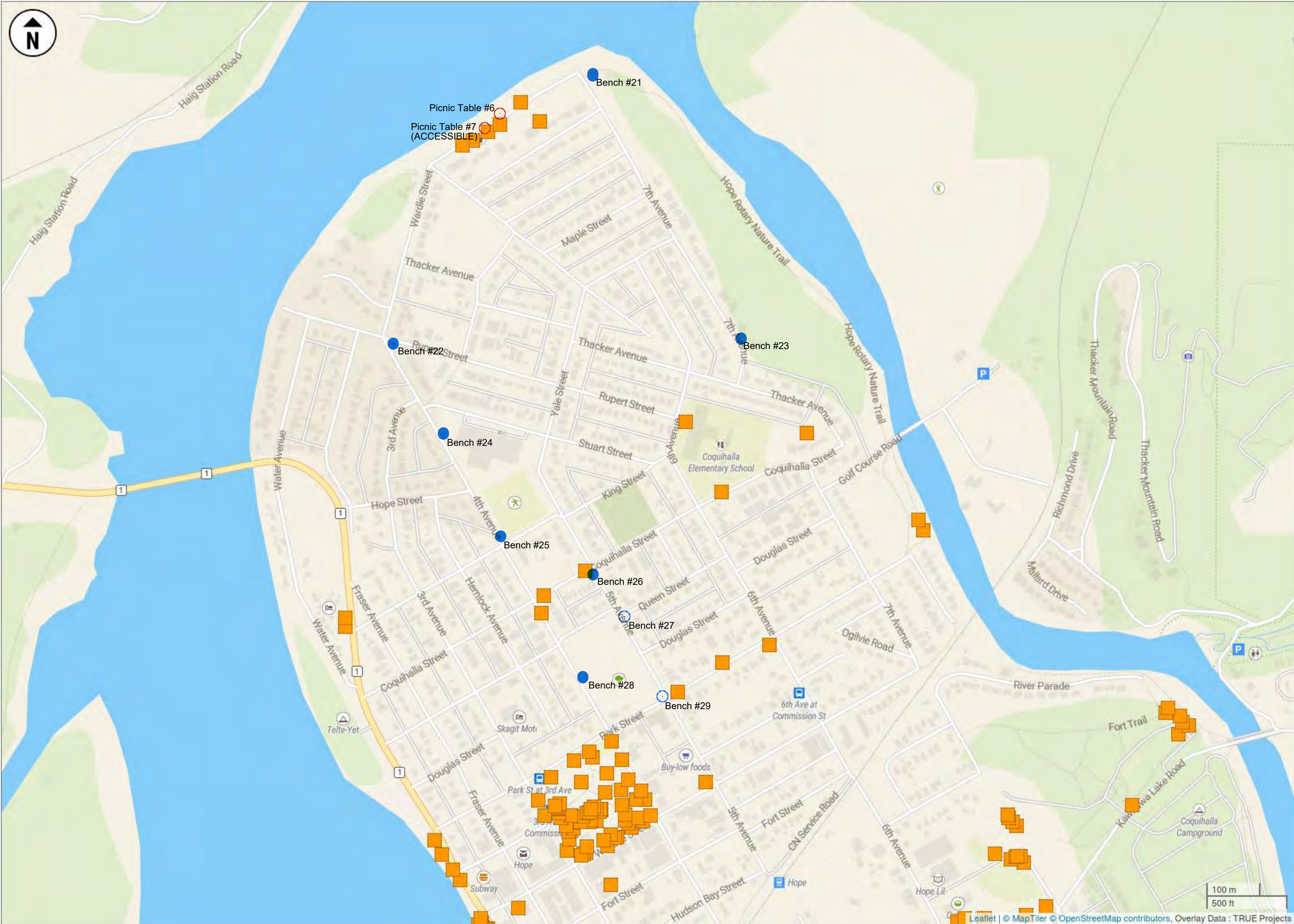

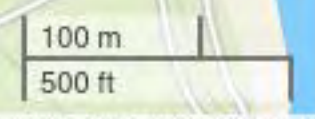

ANALYSIS:

Official Community Plan

The OCP Land Use Designation for the property and most of the surrounding area is Highway Commercial. The proposed change to a Light/Service Industry designation is supported holistically by the Official Community Plan (OCP) through the community goals. Related OCP policies include:

- 4.1 To retain Industrial Lands to support local economic development.
- 4.2 To encourage Light Industrial uses that help to diversify the local economy including light manufacturing, technology, transportation & non-resource base uses.
- 4.3 Encourage Light Industrial development, including a business park, along Flood Hope Road west of Highway 1.

Council may wish to consider the limited availability of industrial lands within the District of Hope boundaries and that additional industrial lands may be needed to meet demand. Throughout the Lower Mainland, both Metro Vancouver Regional District and Fraser Valley Regional District have identified shortages of industrial land.

The existing Highway Commercial OCP designation supports rezoning to a commercial zone (C-2) without amending the OCP. The C-2 has more commercial uses such as restaurants, service stations, and motels while the proposed I-2 allows for uses such as equipment sales, service and rentals, and light manufacturing. The applicant has proposed uses of crane rentals or construction of prefabricated homes for the site.

As there are several similar uses between the Highway Commercial zone (C-2) and the requested Light/Service Industrial (I-2) Zone, staff are supportive of the proposal.

Consultation

Public Notice

As per the District of Hope *Application Procedures and Public Hearing/Information Meeting Procedural Bylaw 13/93*, the *Local Government Act* and the *Community Charter*, a notice of public hearing was included in the November 29 and December 6, 2024 editions of the Hope Standard.

In addition, a notification sign was placed on the property and notice of the Public hearing was listed on the District of Hope webpage.

Notice of the public hearing was hand-delivered to all properties within 100 meters of subject property. This included all properties on Estell Road and all homes in the nearby Windmill Seniors Community Mobile Home Park.

Typically notices are mailed out. However, due to the Canada Post strike, regular mail delivery was not an option. To ensure appropriate notification occurred, staff called or emailed the out-of-town property owners to advise of the upcoming public hearing and to electronically deliver the notice.

Local Government Act s.466 (8) “The obligation to deliver a notice...is satisfied if a reasonable effort was made to mail or otherwise deliver the notice.”. Staff are satisfied a reasonable effort has been made to deliver notice and to alert owners and tenants of the proposed bylaw changes.

No comments have been received as of noon on December 4, 2024.

Referrals

In accordance with *Local Government Act* s.477, the local government must consider the OCP amendment proposal in conjunction with its financial plan and waste management plans. To achieve this, the proposal was referred to the:

- Director of Finance – No concerns reported
- Director of Operations – No concerns reported

The proposed bylaws (1591, 2024 and 1592, 2024) will be forwarded to the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure for review after receiving third reading from Council.

Next Steps & Requirements

Road repairs are required along a portion of Estell Road. The applicant must complete these repairs to the satisfaction of the Director of Operations before the proposed OCP and zoning amendments can proceed to adoption.



The red polygon shows the approximate area of Estell Road where repairs are required.

If the bylaws are adopted, the following development permits will be required prior to development:

- Rail & Highway Service Corridor form and character Development Permit and
- Flood & Erosion Development Permit

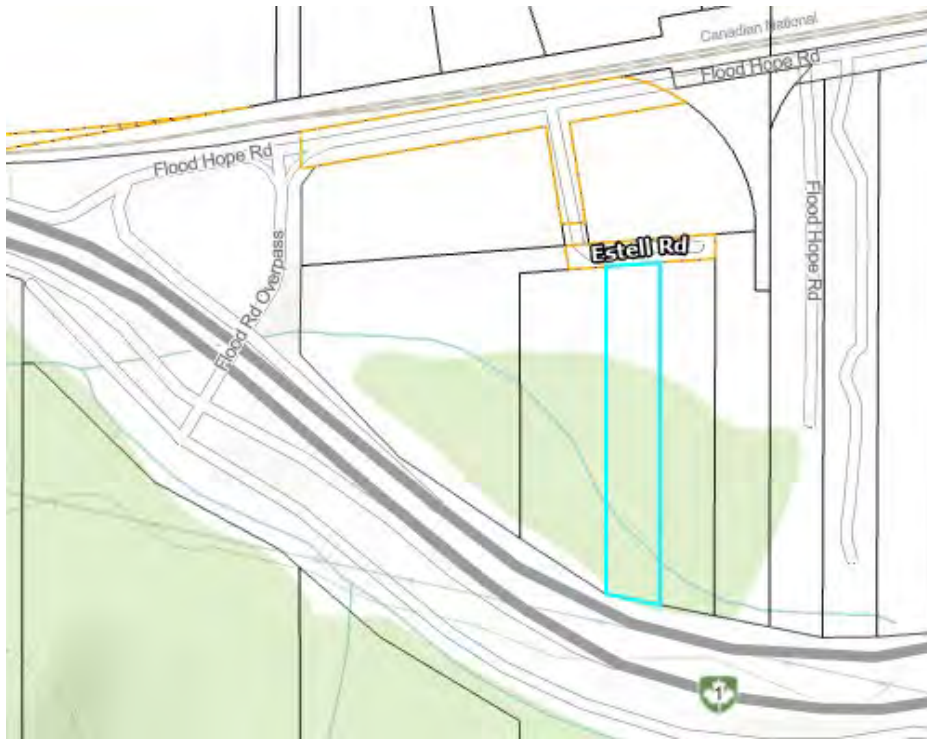

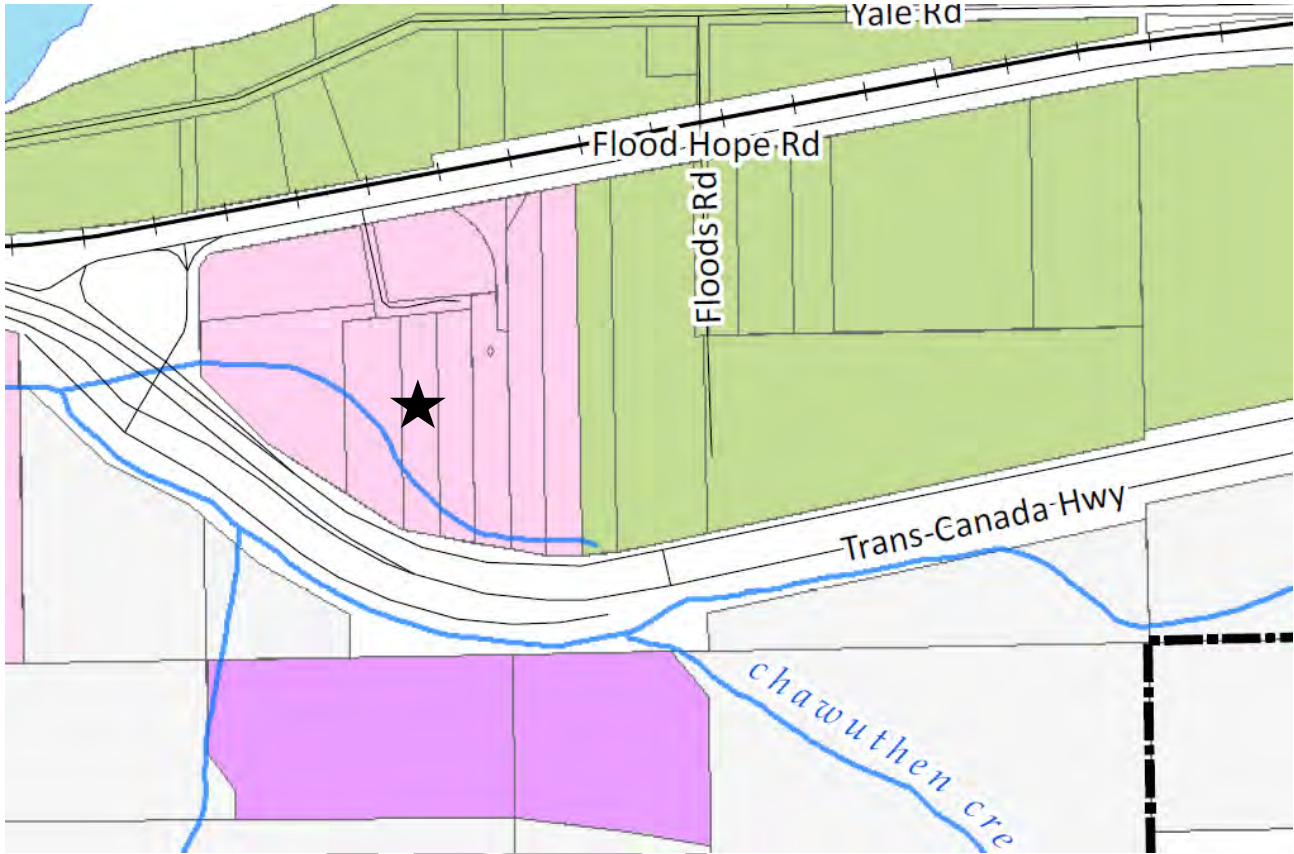

- Schedule “B”, attached to and forming part of this bylaw, outlines the Financial Plan for 2025 to 2029.

Schedule "A"

Statement of Objectives and Policies

In accordance with Section 165(3.1) of the *Community Charter*, municipalities are required to include in the Five-Year Financial Plan, objectives and policies regarding each of the following:

- (a) For each of the funding sources described in Section 165(7) of the *Community Charter*, the proportion of total revenue that is proposed to come from that funding source;
- (b) The distribution of property value taxes among the property classes that may be subject to taxes; and
- (c) The use of permissive tax exemptions.

Over the five-year period of the financial plan, the taxation requirement is estimated to increase annually by a growth factor of (3 - 9%) which covers increases in cost-of-living expenses and increases to contributions to reserves.

The current financial plan provides for \$11,287,400 to be generated from District of Hope property tax base for General Government, Infrastructure Reserve and Policing purposes.

The District has various objectives or policies that govern and affect the budget process and include:

Revenue Objective

- (a) The District will review fees/charges annually to ensure that they keep pace with changes in the cost-of-living as well as changes in the methods or levels of service delivery;
- (b) The District will actively pursue alternative revenue sources to help minimize property taxes;
- (c) The District will consider market rates and charges levied by other public and private organizations for similar services in establishing rates, fees and charges;
- (d) The District will establish cost recovery policies for fee-supported services. The Policies will consider whether the benefits received from the service are public and/or private;
- (e) The District will establish cost recovery policies for services provided for other levels of government;
- (f) General Revenues will not be dedicated for specific purposes, unless required by law or Canadian Public Sector Accounting Standards; and
- (g) The District will develop and pursue new and creative partnerships with government, community institutions (churches, schools), and community groups as well as private and non-profit organizations to reduce costs and enhance service to the community.

Surplus Funds

The *Community Charter* does not allow municipalities to plan an operating deficit (i.e., where expenditures exceed revenues). To ensure this situation does not occur, revenue projections are conservative and authorized expenditures are closely monitored. The combination of conservative revenue projections and controlled expenditures should produce a modest annual operating surplus.

Use of Surplus Funds

- (a) Council will review options and provide direction to staff regarding the allocation of any operating surplus prior to completion of the budget process for the following year.
- (b) To ensure the Accumulated Surplus is not excessive, the balance in the accumulated surplus account should not exceed a specific amount or guideline. The guideline is that Accumulated Surplus should not exceed 10% of the net operating budget.
- (c) Accumulated Surplus funds above the 10% guideline shall be used to:
 - i. fund capital expenditures or to increase reserves;
 - ii. pay off capital debt, including internal borrowings;
 - iii. stabilize District property tax and utility rate increases;
 - iv. fund other items as Council deems appropriate.
- (d) Staff will facilitate Council's review of the amount of Accumulated Surplus funds available on an annual basis.

Debt Objective

- (a) One-time capital improvements and unusual equipment purchases;
- (b) When the useful project life will exceed the term of financing;
- (c) Major equipment purchases;
- (d) Debt servicing is limited to no more than a 3% tax increase per year;
- (e) The maximum borrowing amount be limited to 25% (*Community Charter* allows for 25%) of the District's revenues as defined by the *Community Charter*; and
- (f) Reserves are to be considered as a funding source before debt.

Reserve Funds

Reserve funds shall be set aside to:

- (a) Provide sources of funds for future capital expenditures;
- (b) Provide a source of funding for areas of expenditure that fluctuate significantly from year to year (equipment replacement, special building maintenance, etc.);
- (c) Protect the District from uncontrollable or unexpected increases in expenditures or unforeseen reductions in revenues, or a combination of the two; and
- (d) Provide for working capital to ensure sufficient cash flow to meet the District's needs throughout the year.

Proportion of Taxes Allocated to Classes

It is Council's goal to ensure that there is a fair and equitable apportionment of taxes to each property class. The apportionment to each class is calculated using the multipliers determined by Council prior to preparing the annual tax rate bylaw. The tax multipliers will be reviewed and set by Council annually.

It should be noted that the multiplier is an estimate based on the approved tax rate increase.

Permissive Tax Exemptions

Permissive tax exemptions will be approved annually by Council. All applications for permissive tax exemptions will be considered in accordance with the Permissive Tax Exemption Policy.

Revitalization Tax Exemption

A revitalization tax exemption was available within a defined downtown area and provided a financial incentive to encourage development in the town center. The current bylaw has expired, however there are some active agreements still in effect until they expire.

Development Cost Charges

Development cost charges will be used to help fund capital projects deemed to be required in whole or in part due to development in the community. These charges will be set by bylaw and reviewed at a minimum every year to ensure that project estimates remain reasonable and the development costs charges are aligned with the strategic goals of Council.
